






FIRST READING: 2 Kings 5:1-3, 7-15c

Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man and in high favor with his master, because by him the Lord had given victory to Aram. The man, though a mighty warrior, suffered from leprosy. Now the Arameans on one of their raids had taken a young girl captive from the land of Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. She said to her mistress, "If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy." When the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, "Am I God, to give death or life, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his leprosy? Just look and see how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me." But when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent a message to the king, "Why have you torn your clothes? Let him come to me, that he may learn that there is a prophet in Israel." So Naaman came with his horses and chariots, and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house. Elisha sent a messenger to

him, saying, "Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored, and you shall be clean." But Naaman became angry and went away, saying, "I thought that for me he would surely come out, and stand and call on the name of the Lord his God, and would wave his hand over the spot, and cure the leprosy! Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them, and be clean?" He turned and went away in a rage. But his servants approached and said to him, "Father, if the prophet had commanded you to do something difficult, would you not have done it? How much more, when all he said to you was, 'Wash, and be clean'?" So, he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was restored like the flesh of a young boy, and he was clean. Then he returned to the man of God, he and all his company; he came and stood before him and said, "Now I know that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel; please accept a present from your servant."

SECOND READING: 2 Timothy 2:8-15

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David—that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore, I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure: If we have died with him, we will also live with him; if we endure, we will also reign with him; if we deny him, he will also deny us; if we are faithless, he remains faithful— for he cannot deny himself. Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.



He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father.







Listening for the Promise

WEEKLY DEVOTIONAL

Eighteenth Sunday after Pentecost (Proper 23) - October 9, 2022

"Praise the LORD! I will give thanks to the LORD with my whole heart, in the company of the upright, in the congregation."

-Psalm 111:1-

Psalm 111, known as a hymn of praise, opens with a call to praise the Lord as the psalmist proclaims "I will give thanks to the LORD with my whole heart" (v. 1). The Hebrew word $l\bar{e}b\bar{a}b$, translated "heart," helps us understand the depth and breadth of the thanks the psalmist offers the Lord. $L\bar{e}b\bar{a}b$, according to Strong's Concordance, includes the whole of one's inner being, one's mind, understanding, will, and affections.

It seems the totality of the psalmist's being enters into adoring thanksgiving as he remembers the works of the Lord. His works are "great" and "studied by all who delight in them" (v. 2). They are "full of splendor and majesty" (v. 3). "He provides food" and "remembers his covenant forever" (v. 4). He gives his people "the inheritance of the nations" (v. 6). He establishes and makes known his precepts (see vv. 7–8). He redeems his people and keeps his covenant with them forever (see v. 9).

But significantly, the psalmist looks beyond the works of the Lord to the character of the Lord his works reveal. The Lord is righteous (see v. 3), "gracious and merciful" (v. 4), "faithful" (v. 7), "holy and awesome" (v. 9). His "great" (v. 2) and "wondrous" (v. 4) works, "full of splendor and majesty" (v. 3) reveal a great and wondrous God, full of splendor and majesty. God is powerful, and he uses that power to generously provide for his people (see v. 6).

Finally, and most notably, God redeems his people and promises to remain loyal to his covenant relationship with them forever. This great God whom the psalmist so beautifully portrays is a God who saves. He is a God who makes relationship with people, then and now, his priority. And, in the context of that relationship, he gives us his "just" and "trustworthy" precepts (see v. 7) that teach us how to live a whole and fruitful life in him.

No wonder the psalmist breaks out in praise! No wonder his whole being reverberates with affectionate thanksgiving.

And we can do the same as we remember and ponder all the wonderous works of God in our own lives that point to our wonderous God himself.
