CHRISTMAS PROCLAMATION

PRELUDE The Holly and the Ivy arr. by Noel Rawsthorne "The Holly and the Ivy" is a Christmas carol which foretells the events of Good Friday. The thorns of the holly represent Jesus' crown of thorns, and its red berries symbolize his blood.

CONFESSION and FORGIVENESS

P: In the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

C: Amen.

P: Amid the shadows of this world, let us confess our sins and welcome the light of God's forgiveness.

(period of silence for reflection and self-examination)

- C: In Christ Jesus You come among us as light shining in the darkness. We confess that we have not welcomed the light, nor trusted the good news of great joy. Forgive us and renew our hope, so that we may live in the fullness of Your love, trusting in the grace of Christ our Lord. Amen.
- P: The angel said, "You shall call His name Jesus for He will save His people from their sins." With great joy, I announce to you the entire forgiveness of your sins, in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit.
- C: Amen.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 52:7-10

How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of the messenger who announces peace, who brings good news, who announces salvation, who says to Zion, "Your God reigns." Listen! Your sentinels lift up their voices, together they sing for joy; for in plain sight they see the return of the Lord to Zion. Break forth together into singing, you ruins of Jerusalem; for the Lord has comforted his people, he has redeemed Jerusalem. The Lord has bared his holy arm before the eyes of all the nations; and all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 1:1-4

Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs.

RESPONSIVE READING: Psalm 97: 1, 6, 11, 12

- P: The Lord is King! Let the earth rejoice!
- C: The heavens proclaim His righteousness; and all the people behold His glory!
- P: Light dawns for the righteous, and joy for the upright in heart.
- C: Rejoice in the Lord, O you righteous, and give thanks to His holy name!

- P: The Holy Gospel according to the first chapter of John.
- C: Glory to You, O Lord.

THE HOLY GOSPEL: John 1:1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

RESPONSIVE READING: Psalm 98:1-4

- P: O sing to the Lord a new song, for He has done marvelous things.
- C: His right hand and His holy arm have gotten Him victory.
- P: The Lord has made know His victory.
- C: He has revealed His vindication in the sight of the nations.
- P: He has remembered His steadfast love and faithfulness to the house of Israel.
- C: All the ends of the earth have seen the victory of our God.
- P: Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth; break forth into song and sing praise!



Listening for the Promise

WEEKLY DEVOTIONAL

Nativity of Our Lord (Christmas Day) - December 25, 2022

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, the Word was God." -Iohn 1:1-

The Christmas story according to St. John is not one filled with angels or shepherds. St. John does not even mention a manger or a donkey, let alone Joseph or Mary. For many, it seems strange, out of place to include the first chapter from the Gospel of John on Christmas Day. That said, St. John's account of Christ's arrival is a special one. It takes us on a journey back in history – not just to the physical birth of Jesus – but all the way back to the beginning of creation.

The Word, spoken into the midst of darkness and chaos, brought order into being through the creation of the universe. The Word created again in Jesus Christ, our Savior. And the same Word creates today when one receives the gift of faith in Jesus Christ.

The Word made flesh is the Living Word. The Word continues to create each and every day. St. John's account of the Christmas story is special and unique. Throughout the season of Advent, we visited the many ways that God comes to us. *Emmanuel*, the name given to the Word made flesh, means "God with us." St. John reminds us that God has always been and always will be with us. It wasn't just in a manger over 2,000 years ago. St. John doesn't focus so heavily on the details of Jesus' birth. Rather, his interest is in *our* birth – our new birth in Christ as a child of God.

One of my favorite Christmas hymns dates back to around the fourth century – one of the oldest hymns of the early church – called Of the Father's Love Begotten. The original words were written by Aurelius Clemens Prudentius, who lived from 348 A.D. – ca. 413. The words to the first verse are: "Of the Father's love begotten, Ere the worlds began to be, He is Alpha and Omega, He the source, the ending He, Of the things that are and have been, And that future years shall see, Evermore and evermore." Everything begins and ends in God. His promises last forever. His presence is forever. His love and forgiveness are forever. May we be filled with the hope and good news of Jesus Christ our Lord.

Prayer: Gracious God, on this day as we celebrate the greatest gift ever given, we give you thanks for our Savior Jesus Christ. Amen.
